## Monday 27th December 2021

#### Marrakech – City

The Jewish community has a long history in Marrakech with a history stretching back to antiquity under the Roman empire following the destruction of the Temple. The community played a prominent role in Moroccan life until the formation of the state of Israel when large numbers left to emigrate to Israel. A noticeable legacy has however been left by the community both physically and culturally. We will visit the old medina & it's beautiful 500 year old shul. A chance to explore the souks & the world's famous Djemaa El Fna, featuring story tellers, acrobats, snake-charmers and magicians. Time permitting we will meet the President of the Jewish community.

#### Marrakech – Atlas Mountains

Jews were living in Morocco for 2000 years since the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem. Berber Jews lived in the Atlas Mountains. We will visit a Berber village and see how the Jews used to live. Explore the incredible mountain graveside of Rabbi Shlomo Bel Hence and learn about his legacy.

## Tuesday 28th December 2021

#### Casablanca

Casablanca is the dynamic economic capital of Morocco & is home to the largest Jewish community in Morocco today. We will tour the ONLY Jewish Museum in the Islamic world & walk round Casablanca City, seeing the 'Street of the Seven Synagogues' & the famous Bet El Synagogue.

Our visit to the Hassan II Mosque (the second largest functioning mosque in Africa and 7th biggest in the world) will be eye opening. We hope to have an opportunity to meet with the power team of Rabbi & Rebbetzen Sebbag, together with the beautiful children of the local Talmud Torah (School). Dinner in the local club.

## Wednesday 29th December 2021

#### Rabat

The political capital of Morocco houses the main palace of the King. We will visit its Jewish Quarter, the Mellah with it's the synagogue of Rabbi Shalom Zaoui. Our visit to the the Mausoleum of the late King Mohammed V will showcase the deep relationship between the Jews of Morocco and its Kings. Time permitting we will have a chance to visit the famous Kasbah Des Oudaia gardens.

#### Meknes

Jews settled in the region of Meknes before the advent of Islam. Until the 19th century the community of Meknes was one of the best developed and organized in Morocco. It was a city of Chakhamim(Rabbis) and merchants. Once known as the Jerusalem of Morocco, now a dwindling community of some 7 Jews. We will visit the local Talmud Torah & the new and ancient cemeteries. An opportunity to see the Bab Mansour Laleuj gates

#### Fes

Fes is considered Morocco's spiritual capital & is a designated UNESCO World Heritage Site. We will experience the 17th Century Ibn Danan Synagogue inside the Mellah (the Jewish Quarter), as well as the old Jewish cemetery. Here there will be a powerful opportunity to connect at some of the holiest grave-sites of Great Rabbis and Holy Women. We will visit the Dar al-Makhzen – the royal palace of the Alaouite Sultan & the stunningly beautiful Bensadoun Shul

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## Thursday 30th December 2021


#### Fes

The Medina of Fes preserves, in an ancient part comprising numerous monumental buildings, the memory of the capital founded by the Idrisid dynasty between 789 and 808 A.D. Considered one of the most extensive & best conserved historic towns of the Arab-Muslim world. It not only represents an outstanding architectural, archaeological and urban heritage, but also transmits a life style, skills and a culture that persist and are renewed despite the diverse effects of the evolving modern societies. A visit to the famous Tannery, factories, shouks and more. An opportunity to visit the Rambam's House.

Get ready for Shabbat & pre-Shabbat tisch. Shabbat dinner at Tamid restaurant. Welcome in the new year with the firework display over the straights of Gibraltar.
